Update on Family Care Team Progress in Newfoundland and Labrador

Objective

To report on the progress of Family Care Team in Newfoundland and Labrador (NL).

Practice Points

- 1. Reports indicate that over 20% of NL's population do not have a family doctor.
- 2. NL, Canada, and many countries worldwide are struggling to recruit family doctors.
- 3. Family Care Teams aim to improve access and continuity of primary health care (PHC) for individuals and families in their community. They shift from solo-based community practice and program-based models of service delivery to an inter-disciplinary team-based model. Family Care Teams offer access to multiple health care professionals that focus on meeting the health and social needs of individuals and families.

Methods

- 1. Data were provided by Newfoundland and Labrador Health Services (NLHS).
- 2. Connected patients have been onboarded to a clinic and are receiving all or some services.
- 3. A patient in an affiliated practice refers to an individual who receives primary care from a family physician who has linked their practice with a Family Care Team. These patients have access to the full range of interdisciplinary services and supports offered through the Family Care Team. Their care is integrated and coordinated across providers.

Results




Figure 1. Family Care Teams by Location in NL with Operational Status as of Aug 2025

- As of Aug 2025, NL has 21 operational Family Care Teams compared to 14 in Nov 2023.
- Some patients are waiting to connect to a specific Family Care Team. Others are non-specific or waiting in regions without a Family Care Team.




Figure 2. Number of Patients Connected, Waiting to be Connected, and Affiliated in NL, Jun 2023–Aug 2025

 As of Aug 2025, 112,695 patients are connected and affiliated with a Family Care Team. Of those, 82,922 are connected to a Family Care Team, and 29,773 are affiliated with a Family Care Team. 42,203 patients are waiting to connect to a Family Care Team.

Conclusions

- 1. Since Nov 2023, the number of patients connected to a Family Care Team has increased from 51,030 to 82,922, a 62% increase.
- 2. Demand remains steady as the waitlist for a Family Care Team remains above 40,000 despite the increase in connected patients as over 2,000 new patients are registering each month.
- 3. To address the existing waitlist, there will need to be more Family Care Teams and resources associated with them determined by community needs assessment.
- 4. The success of Family Care Teams will be dependent on teamwork, health providers working at their full scope of practice, efficiency in seeing an appropriate number of patients per day, the ability to recruit staff, and implementing the framework which outlines the vision for Family Care Teams in the future.
